

Sunday, October 11 ~ 19th Sunday after Pentecost

In a flash in the middle of the road, God unravels Saul's identity as a persecutor of Christ-followers and invites him to blindly stumble onto a new path. His conversion requires Ananias, a disciple vulnerable to Paul's threats, to place his hands on Saul's eyes so that he might see the world anew as Paul the Apostle. This new path for Paul later leads him to endure prison, persecution, travel, and trial. However, it also

comes with new life, community, belonging, and hope. Sometimes God calls us into uncharted territory, and maybe our unraveling is simply a holy, fresh start.

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Gathering Words/Welcome and Announcements

SERVICE OF WORD AND PRAYER

If possible, prepare your worship space with a cup filled with water and an empty bowl. The presence of water reminds us of God's forgiveness that comes to us through the Sacrament of Baptism. During this time of physical distance and fasting from the Sacrament of Holy Communion, we cling with confident hope to the promise that by God's love and grace, we are made one with Christ in baptism.

Call to Worship and Confession:

God of mystery, you called Ananias by name and he responded, "Here I am." You called Paul to the work of your Church, and he responded by giving his life to your Word. Similarly, you call us into community and faith, So we respond with love and time, energy and hope. We respond with worship. Let us worship the God of transformation and grace. Amen.

Have mercy on us. In your compassion forgive us our sins, known and unknown, things done and left undone. Uphold us by your Spirit so that we may live and serve you in newness of life, to the honor and glory of your holy name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen**

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.



WE HEAR GOD'S WORD



Reading: Acts 9:1-20

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ²and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" ⁵He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." ⁷The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. ⁸Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. ⁹For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

¹⁰Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." ¹¹The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, ¹²and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." ¹³But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; ¹⁴and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." ¹⁵But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; ¹⁶I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." ¹⁷So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." ¹⁸And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength. For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, ²⁰and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God." The word of the Lord.



Reflection

Unraveling – the word brings to mind a beautiful knit sweater with one thread hanging out. Somehow that thread catches, and the whole beautiful pattern comes apart into a confusing, jumbled mess. Of course, unraveling can happen to more than just sweaters – plans, ideas, and lives can unravel into a jumbled mess just as they seem to be coming to fruition. Such was the case with Saul. Saul's life was a model of organization and planning – trained and educated and dedicated to be a diligent follower of Jehovah God. And Saul was not about to let some upstart group of Jesus followers upset the apple cart. He was at the stoning of Stephen, and he dedicated himself to ridding the world of this group and their heresies. As a result, Saul finds himself on the road to Damascus infused with zealous purpose. And it's here where God pulls on that little thread hanging out, and Saul's life comes apart, and he can only cry out, "Who are you, Lord?"

How about us? When that lighted ball dropped on Times Square and everyone shouted, "Happy New Year 2020!", things seemed pretty organized, pretty defined, and the way forward seemed clear. And then there was a pandemic, and political pandemonium, and recession, and racial divisions, and fires, and hurricanes, and we haven't even talked about all the personal trials that always surround us – death, aging, loss, isolation. Yes, the little and not so little dangling threads hanging out of our buttoned down, organized lives got pulled, and, like Saul, we find ourselves at the end of our ability to control things, crying, "Where are you, Lord?"

But back to the story of Saul. In Damascus, a faithful follower of this Jesus, Ananias, was having his life unraveled by the raging dedication of Saul. In spite of this, the Jesus he loved was telling him to go and heal the very Saul who was the enemy trying to arrest him. Right here, in the midst of Ananias's fear and confusion, Jesus reminds him of another meaning for unravel that we tend to forget when we are confused and frightened. Unravel doesn't just mean to pull apart something that's organized. It also means to unravel a confusing mystery and make the incomprehensible understandable. In the debris of two unraveled lives, God was unraveling and clarifying and shining a light on the divine plan of salvation for humanity – and calling Saul and Ananias to be part of it. Like both of them, we often get so afraid and distracted and overwhelmed with the all the debris and noise and loss of our unraveled world and lives that we forget to look and hear and be loved by the God who is shining a light on our false sense of security, who is pleading with us to abandon our controlling patterns, who is unraveling the mystery of life and offering us a new, abundant life. Lord, open us to hear, open us to see, open us to the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Open us to the peace that passes all understanding.
