

## Sunday, October 18 ~ 20th Sunday after Pentecost

Zacchaeus perpetuates and profits from an economic system that robs and defrauds those on the bottom to benefit those on the top. He is a wealthy tax collector, which means he is not welcomed or wanted by most. Jesus flips the script by inviting Zacchaeus to offer him hospitality, which unravels the crowd's expectations since they deem Zacchaeus a sinner and an unworthy host. Jesus invites Zacchaeus into community. Jesus

invites Zacchaeus to belong. Zacchaeus responds with generosity, vowing to share his resources equitably. Zacchaeus shows us a holy and joyful unraveling.

### Gracious God.




## **Reading:** Luke 19:1-10

Living together in trust and hope, we confess our faith.


I believe in God, the Father almighty,







#### Reflection

Life turns on a dime sometimes, doesn't it? Things can unravel at the drop of a hat - a diagnosis, an accident, a relationship dies, a job offer arrives, your house sells in 5 days - you get the picture. So in this week's gospel (Luke 19: 1-10), we find several unravelings. Zacchaeus, a Jew and a tax collector so an outcast among his people, wants to see Jesus and climbs a tree to be able to do so. When Jesus sees him, he calls him down because Zacchaeus was to be hosting Jesus in his home that night.

Some grumblers in the crowd complained that Jesus should not be hanging out with a traitor and a sinner. Apparently Zacchaeus heard and told Jesus that he would give half of his wealth to the poor and anyone he had defrauded, he would pay back four times as much. (It seems that tax collectors make their money by collecting taxes plus more for their "commission.") We don't get to know the rest of Zacchaeus's story after Jesus tells the grumblers that salvation has come to the tax man's house and after all, he came to reach sinners and the lost but it is likely that Zacchaeus's old life is unraveled and a new one is born.

But what about the grumblers? What unraveled for them? Perhaps they want Jesus to judge as they do and condemn those that they condemn. When he doesn't how should they respond? Maybe Jesus was not just referring to Zacchaeus when he reminded the crowd that he came for sinners and the lost. We know the rest of the story of Jesus's time on earth, of course, and so many of his followers were looking for a political leader and Jesus kept unraveling that assumption of him.

So then, who are we in this story? Are we chasing after Jesus because we want to hear him and change? Or are we the grumblers wanting divine intervention on those we don't like? I know I am more of a grumbler than a Zacchaeus but I keep trying. Jesus changed Z's life by recognizing him and by reminding the grumblers what his mission was on earth and thereby suggesting that the grace of God is available to all of us imperfect as we are. The challenge then and now is to allow grace to unravel us and reravel us in a new way. Alleluia!
