

³⁴Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin.


³⁵The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever.



Sending Hymn:

A Mighty Fortress Is Our God

Today's sending hymn is a collaboration of several congregations in the Genesee Finger Lakes Conference. Due to the nature of the arrangement, two different translations of the text are used throughout the arrangement. Verses 1 and 4 are taken from hymn #505 in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) (credited to Martin Luther, tr. Frederick H. Hedge, alt. © 2006, Augsburg Fortress). Verses 2 and 3 are taken from ELW #503 (credited to Martin Luther, tr. Lutheran Book of Worship, © 1978 Lutheran Book of Worship, admin. Augsburg Fortress). The rhythm and melody change from verses 1 to 2 and from 3 to 4.

- 1. A mighty fortress is our God, a bulwark never failing; our helper frees us from the flood of mortal ills prevailing. For still our ancient foe, forsworn to work us woe, with guile and dreadful might is armed to wage the fight: on earth there is no equal.
- 2. No strength of ours can match his might! We should be lost, rejected.
 But now a champion comes to fight,
 Whom God himself elected.
 Ask who this may be:
 Lord of hosts is he!
 Christ Jesus mighty Lord,
 God's only son adored.
 He holds the field victorious.
- 3. Though hordes of devils fill the land all threat'ning to devour us, we tremble not, unmoved we stand; they cannot overpow'r us.
 This world's prince may rage, in fierce war engage.
 He is doomed to fail;

God's judgment must prevail! One little word subdues him.

4. God's Word shall stand above the pow'rs shall end all their thanksgiving.

Reflection

In an essay entitled "Grace," the writer Kathleen Norris recounts an experience at an airport departure gate where a young couple with an infant were waiting to depart.

"The baby was staring intently at other people, and as soon as he recognized a human face, no matter whose it was, no matter if it was young or old, pretty or ugly, bored or happy or worried-looking he would respond with absolute delight. It was beautiful to see. Our drab departure gate had become the gate of heaven. . . . I realized that this is how God looks at us, staring into our faces in order to be delighted, to see the creature he made and called good along with the creation."

Though the scenario she describes seems like a distant memory, is there any more enchanting image of a gracious God than this one captured by Norris? I can almost picture the ways that hardened roadwarriors conducting one last business call before boarding the plane are unraveled by this smiling, cooing infant so delighted to see their faces, even when they are preoccupied with important work. A gift of grace indeed!

For Martin Luther, it wasn't an infant but St. Paul's words about God's grace that opened his faith to a new way of seeing and knowing God. For there is no distinction, since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus (Romans 3:23-24). In these words, a lifetime of trying to earn God's love and favor was undone as God's free grace unraveled Luther's life.

God's free gift of grace is the truth that has been written on our hearts. We do not earn it. We cannot achieve it. It is ours to receive freely. And this free gift of grace is the source of our worship and praise on this Reformation Sunday, October 25, and every day of our lives!

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
