Gracious God,



ELW 508, vs 1



Reading: Jeremiah 29:1-7

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. ²This was after King Jeconiah, and the queen mother, the court officials, the leaders of Judah and Jerusalem, the artisans, and the smiths had departed from Jerusalem. ³The letter was sent by the hand of Elasah son of Shaphan and Gemariah son of Hilkiah, whom King Zedekiah of Judah sent to Babylon to King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon. It said: ⁴Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the

exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: ⁵Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. ⁶Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. ⁷But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare. 



Reflection

By now some within the community of Bethlehem Lutheran are relieved by the results of this week's election and for some the level of anxiety has only heightened. The 2020 election has exposed divisions that have left families scarred and friendships broken. I hear family and friends asking questions and trying to understand the results of this election. In this environment, I continue to ask the perennial Lutheran question, "What does this mean?"

God has always promised to walk with us in the midst of fear, anxiety, and questions. Again and again in scripture, when God's people face uncertainty, God's messengers greet them with the simple greeting, "Do not fear." We need not fear because we live confident of Christ's promise, "where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." (Matthew 18:20). The results of this week's election may leave us confused or troubled and uncertain of where to turn, but Christ is with us even now.

And because Christ is still with us and living through us, we continue to serve as his hands, his feet, his heart, and his words in this world. Loving our neighbors as Christ loves us remains our ever-present task, but a task made harder when the divides between us are laid bare as they have been in this election. On both sides of the political divide, I've heard voices ask, "How can I love my neighbors when their views threaten my very existence?"

I feel stuck. On the one hand, I believe that our path forward depends upon remembering our shared humanity and recalling that even my neighbor who voted differently than me, carries the image and likeness of God. On the other hand, I realize that even suggesting such a thing to those who feel threatened feels like a painful betrayal. It's easy for me to say, "let's just love our neighbors" when I don't personally fear that my neighbor wants to destroy me or my way of life.

If you find yourself deeply wounded and hurting this week, know that Christ sees you. Christ hears you. Christ is with you. Christ wants *you* to have and know abundant life.

And if, like me, you find yourself wondering how we find a path forward in the midst of so much division, remember that Christ calls us to join him on the right road where he offers abundant life for *all* people and asks us to be partners in making this abundant life visible. We join him on the journey and ask him to give us faith to travel with courage and hope, not knowing where we go, but confident that his hand is leading us, and his love supporting us.
