Gracious God,



Reading: Ephesians 1:15-23

¹⁵I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason ¹⁶I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, ¹⁸so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, ¹⁹and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. ²⁰God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46

[Jesus said to the disciples:] ³¹"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. ³²All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, ³³and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. ³⁴Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; ³⁵for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' ³⁷Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? ³⁸And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? ³⁹And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' ⁴⁰And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you,

just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family you did it to me.' ⁴¹Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; ⁴²for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, ⁴³I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' ⁴⁴Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' ⁴⁵Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' ⁴⁶And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Reflection

Christ the King Sunday – the last Sunday of the liturgical church year. And what a year it has been!

Wednesday morning Bible Study has been working our way through the book of Acts. We've been learning about the early church and its struggles. Most of the book is about Paul and his 3 missionary journeys. One of the places he visited, lived and taught was the young church in Ephesus – our lesson this week from Ephesians is a letter he wrote to the people after he had moved on. He gives thanks for them and remembers them in his prayers. A lesson we all can follow on this week before Thanksgiving.

Included in this prayer of thanksgiving, he writes "that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you." He – that Christ the King whom we celebrate this week. He - The Christ who reminds us to care for our neighbor. Paul is caring for the people of Ephesus by giving them hope. The hope to which our Lord and Savior has called them and us. Martin Luther wrote "Everything that is done in the world is done by hope." We have much to do in our world, in our nation, in our cities, in our neighborhoods and in our families. We cling to hope as we finish 2020 and begin a new year. May we uplift each other the way Paul uplifted the people of Ephesus.

New hope begins every day when we wake up – and in the church year, it begins next week with Advent. Peace be with you all as you cling to hope!
