





God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. ... The Lord Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. - from Psalm 46 NIV.

Not too long ago, my husband David and I walked down a street in Wittenberg, Germany. As we rounded the corner of this historic road, my eyes immediately were drawn to the top of the tower of the Castle Church (known as the church where Martin Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the door). The words encircling the top were written in German, but I knew them well. **Ein Feste Burg, ist unser Gott.** *A Mighty Fortress is our God!* I was surprised at the emotion I felt at seeing these words. I was standing on the road, trod frequently by Luther, himself. I imagined the pain that Luther endured as he walked through his own wilderness. His very life was endangered as he challenged the religious and political figures of the day. Seeing these words proclaimed boldly at the tower's peak is a witness to Luther's source of strength: The Lord Almighty. I am thankful for his conviction that the words of scripture be written in the language of the people, so that all may find hope, comfort, and peace, through God's Word, just as Luther did as he walked in his wilderness.

This past year, the people of this world have traveled through many wildernesses. I often lay awake at night, in my own personal wilderness, worrying about the pandemic and the suffering it has brought worldwide, the divisions in our country, and any personal issue I may be facing. During the dark of night, I often reflect on the scripture verses that my father would quote, especially Psalm 46 which sustained him in his final hours. I remember how my mother would share with me that singing hymns would comfort her as she faced widowhood. Sometimes, I silently "sing" my favorite hymns. I have found hope in my wilderness from the words from Luther's well-known hymn, **A Mighty Fortress is Our God.** I am particularly drawn to the final words of this song. "Were they to take our house, goods, honor, child, or spouse, though life be wrenched away, they cannot win the day. The Kingdom's ours forever! God's promise to walk through the wilderness with me is a forever and unbroken promise. "This is most certainly true."
