#### Gospel: Mark 8:27-38

After Peter confesses his belief that Jesus is the Messiah, Jesus tells his disciples for the first time what is to come. Peter's response indicates that he does not yet understand the way of the cross that Jesus will travel.

<sup>27</sup>Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" <sup>28</sup>And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." <sup>29</sup>He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." <sup>30</sup>And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him. <sup>31</sup>[Jesus] began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again.<sup>32</sup>He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. <sup>33</sup>But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

<sup>34</sup>He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. <sup>35</sup>For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. <sup>36</sup>For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? <sup>37</sup>Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? <sup>38</sup>Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

I was very young, not yet 30. I had been married 3 years when my husband told me he didn't love me anymore and he wanted a divorce. I laughed, thinking he was joking, but he wasn't. We separated and were divorced 2 years later. Luckily, there were no children. But there were friends and family that did not understand, and were very hurt and upset. "They are your friends", my now ex-husband said.

After he told me he wanted a divorce, I called my parents. My father told me "you aren't going anywhere. If he wants to leave, let him leave." My father was truly my father, strong, calm, and what I needed at that time.

I had very good friends who suggested I seek out some legal advice, which I did. That was also what I needed at that time. And my friends let me just come over, sit until I wanted to go home. They would feed me and just be there for me without judgment or questions.

I felt like my heart had been ripped from my chest. I was in shock for 2 months. I went to work as a nurse, and was able to minister to people in pain and who suffered losses like I hadn't before. It is amazing how God uses our difficulties for the good of others, and us!

My church family accepted me as if I had done nothing wrong, when I felt so wrong. I had a place to be loved and accepted, and to participate in God's work. What a blessing!

This was so many years ago. And the pain has lessened, but I still get angry and resentful at times. I didn't have children, and I did not remarry, but there are other blessings. I've been able to be part of the beginnings of Advent House, I was able to travel to Zimbabwe. And I've had lots of other travel as well. God has provided for me in so many ways with wonderful friends, a good job, and loving family! And He has used me to reach out to those in need and those needing love and acceptance. I am so very blessed! God is able to use our pain to grow us, and serve Him in ways we never would imagine without the pain.
