I lift up my eyes to the hills – from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth... - Psalm 121

I love the book of Psalms. Partially because I love poetry; partially because all ranges of emotions are so eloquently expressed. So, this is where I turn when I reach for the Bible. Psalm 121 has always been my favorite. I guess growing up in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia had much to do with that. Whenever I was overwhelmed, fearful or alone, all I had to do was look upward at the Blue Ridge Mountains and feel the reassurance that the Lord would protect me. It was as if a protective warm blanket covered me and I knew not be afraid. Even though those mountains are far, far away in distance and time, I still recite this psalm (although the old King James version is my favorite) when I need comfort. I have always received it. I have faced difficulties in my life, like most of us, but I knew that the warm, comforting blanket of the Lord was always wrapped around me to help me through the dark and difficult times.

This is what comforts me through this pandemic. Sure, there have been inconveniences and sadness over missed gatherings, missed hugs and the isolation from others but I am blessed to be retired, I have plenty of food, I have a warm house and I have love from family and friends. I have so many blessings as God truly walks with me and gives me strength.
