We are transformed by the mercy we have received through Christ and we carry it into the world through our service to one another. Worship ends in solemn silence, as we anticipate the coming days.

Gathering Words/Welcome and Announcements

As Jesus shared a meal with his disciples, you are invited to share a meal as you participate in worship tonight. Gather your meal, candles and matches for your table. Instructions will be given throughout the service for times to pause in order to serve your meal, to eat, to pray, and to clean up. Over the last year, we have learned anew that Christ is with us wherever we gather, and by God's love and grace, we are made one with Christ in baptism, across time and space, even in our meal tonight.

Households are invited to gather around their tables before lighting candles. After the liturgy, hymn, and prayer, you'll be invited to eat.

Candle Lighting:

Creating Father, at creation your light dispelled the darkness of chaos, **Allowing order and beauty to flourish.**


Redeeming Son, you are the light of the world, dispelling the darkness of sin and death. Your light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it.

WE HEAR GOD'S WORD

The holy gospel according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Gospel: John 13:1-17, 31b-35

The story of the last supper in John's gospel recalls a remarkable event not mentioned elsewhere: Jesus performs the duty of a slave, washing the feet of his disciples and urging them to do the same for one other.

¹Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ¹Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ³Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ¹Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." ¹¹For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

^{31b} Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." The Gospel of the Lord.


Reflection

Good Friday, April 2:

Worship will be posted at noon; watch at your convenience! The worship is led in collaboration with nearby Lutheran churches. Together, we will follow the "stations of the cross" as we see Jesus in various parts of our community and in the faces of the people we meet there.

Easter Sunday, April 4: We see Jesus resurrected just as he promised! Livestream worship at 8:30am (available to watch anytime afterwards)

Prepare your worship space by finding/unearthing the Alleluia coloring page that was hidden away on Transfiguration Sunday. (<u>Find it here</u> if you missed it at the start of Lent!) Find something that makes noise - some dry beans in a jar? jingle bells? - and shake them every time you hear "Alleluia" in worship!

Celebrate communion on April 4... Following the communion liturgy (online!), you are invited to make your way to Bethlehem before 11 am to receive the Sacrament. If you or a loved one would like to commune but can't make your way to BLC, please let Pastor Amy know.

All You Need Is Love

Jesus' command today to love one another is not about having good feelings for each other or being "nice." Jesus tells his disciples that they are to love one another "just as I have loved you." By this definition, love means compassion, mercy, and plenty of hard work. As we see in today's gospel, Jesus' love is active in service and, ultimately, sacrifice. All we need is love, but to love as Jesus loves is no easy thing.

Jesus' love is also inclusive, not meant only for the inner circle. Taken in the context of Jesus' teaching and ministry, his love, and the love he has in mind for us, is offered to all of humanity and, in fact, all of God's creation. The world will know that the church follows Jesus not only by our behavior within our own community, but also as we relate to the world. To love as Jesus loved is to cross boundaries, to stand with the lowliest among us, and to challenge the accepted ways in which the world does business.

John's is the only gospel in which Jesus does not institute the Lord's supper at his last Passover with the disciples. At John's last supper Jesus gives himself to them in a different way. His washing of his disciples' feet is an enactment of his witness to the dominion of God: the first will be last; the lowly will be lifted up; whoever loves their life will lose it. This act of self-sacrifice, one which prefigures his death on the cross, is a living example of Jesus' countercultural definition of love, one which he passes on to the twelve and to us. Washed by Jesus in our baptisms, we too are blessed with and challenged by God's love in Christ and the command to share that sacrificial love with the whole world.

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
