

Sunday, August 15, 2021 Mary, Mother of Our Lord

Mary's role is not limited to giving birth to Jesus and mothering him in his childhood. In John's gospel, she is among the women standing near the cross; in Acts, she is among the disciples awaiting the gift of the Spirit. Through all that happened she continued to see how God was at work through her son, keeping the ancient promises to her ancestors, brushing aside the rich and powerful, and focusing on those as poor and powerless as Mary herself.






Invitation to Communion:







Bishop John Stanley Macholz



Bishop Macholz obtained his Master of Divinity from Christ Seminary-Seminex in St. Louis, MO and a Bachelor of Arts in English from Concordia College in Bronxville, NY. He was ordained into the ministry on November 23, 1980.

Bishop Macholz served his first call as Pastor at Faith, Glenmont from November 1980 to August 1990. He was also Dean of the Hudson Mohawk Conference from the fall of 1988 to the summer of 1990. In August 1990, he accepted a call to Atonement Lutheran Church, Rochester. During this time he also served as the Dean of the Genesee Finger Lakes Conference of the Upstate New York Synod. On September 1, 2014, he was installed as Bishop of UNYS; his term ends August 31, 2021.

Bishop Macholz married Linda Givens Hanna in 1976. She is an equal partner in ministry, a strong supporter, and a helpful critic. They have a son, Zachary, who lives with his wife, Jasmin, and daughter in Germany. Their daughter, Barbara Grimaldi, is deceased.

Bishop Macholz has dabbled in pottery, loves to cook and bake, reads in an attempt to keep up with changes and trends in the church and life, and enjoys writing poetry, among other things. An occasional game of golf also produces time apart and assists him in learning new ways to handle frustrations.



Rooted. Growing. Sharing. Members of the Bethlehem community share their stories as we mark our 100th Anniversary in worship this week.

Even before the words "Let there be light", God was making plans. Now, many eons later, these plans seemed of human origin as they came to life in 1921 in Fairport, NY, in the shape of Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church. But make no mistake, that event was God planting a seed, the Good News of Jesus Christ, as part of the eternal plan to bring forth the fruit of the kingdom of God.

And, like all seeds, once planted, it sent out roots gathering people from the surrounding community along with their hopes and dreams. Finally, a small plant emerged. But what the roots draw in does not determine what kind of plant it is – the seed, the gospel of Jesus, ultimately determines what the plant will become. It is this precious seed that reforms, redeems, and renews all that the roots gather. By God's grace, everything the roots gather unites to worship, to study, to fellowship, to celebrate, and even to mourn. Miraculously, growth happens. Sometimes in spurts, sometimes in slow agonizing steps. Sometimes the growing plant needs pruning, and sometimes it gets injured. But always, the precious seed thrives.

In God's good time, this growing plant yields an abundant harvest of lives transformed by the fruit of God's Spirit – "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Gal. 5:22-23). And, in turn, these new lives blossom in the world as people, programs, and ministries that change and enrich everyone and everything they touch. They make all the world a more fertile place for the roots of the plant to gather still more people with their hopes and dreams; to help them grow as part of this plant and to produce more harvests. And so, the cycle continues – the harvest feeds the roots, the roots fuel the growth, the growth produces another harvest. And it all began with the seed – the Good News of Jesus Christ.
