Welcome!

We are so glad to have you share in worship at Bethlehem today. If you are visiting, please introduce yourself to one of the pastors – they would love to greet you personally! At this time, we ask all worshipers to wear masks in worship.

Today's service will be recorded and live-streamed. Our camera operators take care to focus on worship leaders and don't regularly film worshipers. In the movement of the service, glimpses of people may occur. Please speak with a pastor if you have concerns.

Children are welcome and encouraged to participate in worship. We have designated space within the sanctuary (underneath the window of Jesus, the Good Shepherd) that is reserved for families who may need additional space for strollers or carriers for children who cannot yet wear masks. If there is a way we can make worship a more hospitable environment for your family, please speak to a pastor or leave a comment through our website (see above).

Hearing assistance: Our sound system is equipped with personal hearing loop devices. Please ask an usher for a loop device.

Holy Communion: All are welcome to share in Christ's meal of forgiveness and grace. Children who do not yet commune are welcome to come forward for a blessing. (If you feel your child is ready to receive or have additional questions, please speak with one of our pastors.) Please see additional notes about the Sacrament in the service portion of the bulletin.

Our Perrin Street entrance is accessible. Please ask an usher or greeter for help if you need assistance operating the lift.

Please silence your cell phones: As a courtesy to others, we ask that you please silence your cell phones during worship.

Today's Worship Team

We all contribute to worship: lifting our voice in prayer and song, bowing our heads in prayer, opening our ears to hear the Word, and extending our hands to receive the Sacrament. Are you willing to serve in one of these additional roles to contribute to worship this week? Put your name on the sign-up in the narthex and grab the corresponding bulletin so we know the role is filled by you!

Acolyte: Lights the altar candles during the prelude and extinguishes altar candles during the final hymn, bringing the light of Christ out into the world! May robe and sit on the chancel or sit within the congregation during worship. All ages who can safely handle fire and reach the candles are welcome to serve!

Glass Washer: Washes communion glasses either immediately following worship or after Faith Formation for All. Instructions are posted in the sacristy. Many hands make light work so grab a friend to help! (This is also a great opportunity for a household to serve together!)

Offering: Sit in the congregation and bring the offering trays from the entrance of the sanctuary forward to the altar during the offertory, giving our congregation's gifts to the glory of God! Pair up with a child if you'd like, so they can have a hands-on role in worship!

Communion Assistants (2): Sit in the congregation and come forward at the time of communion (when the congregation begins to sing "Lamb of God") to serve the wine/grape juice for communion. Must be able to hold a tray steady and speak the words, "Blood of Christ shed for you!"

Intercessory Prayer Readers (3): From your seat, speak the highlighted petition as part of the intercessory prayers on behalf of the congregation.

Along with welcoming special guests, Each anniversary Sunday celebration is an opportunity to recall a piece of music or form of worship that would have been common among those who came before us at Bethlehem Lutheran Church. The Lutheran Book of Worship (a.k.a. "the green hymnal") was published in 1978 and served as the primary hymnal for our church body until it was replaced by Evangelical Lutheran Worship (a.k.a. "the red hymnal"), published in 2006. Today's liturgy was included as Setting 1 in the Lutheran Book of Worship and Setting 3 in Evangelical Lutheran Worship, meaning that this liturgical music has shaped congregational worship for over forty years of our one hundred year history!

November begins with All Saints Day and ends in or near Advent, when we anticipate Christ's coming again. It is fitting, then, that the readings today tell of the final resurrection and the end time. In the turmoil of hope, fear, and disbelief that these predictions provoke in us, Hebrews sounds a note of confident trust. Christ makes a way for us where there is no way, and we walk it confidently, our hearts and bodies washed in baptismal water, trusting the one who has promised forgiveness. The more we see the last day approaching, the more important it is to meet together to provoke one another to love.

Images of worship and sacrifice are used throughout Hebrews to highlight what Christ has uniquely accomplished through his death. Because we have received forgiveness through Christ's death, we live with sincere hearts by trusting in God's promises and encouraging love and good works from each other.

¹¹Every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. ¹²But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, "he sat down at the right hand of God," 13 and since then has been waiting "until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet." ¹⁴For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified. [15And the Holy Spirit also testifies to us, for after saying,

¹⁶"This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, says the Lord: I will put my laws in their hearts,

¹⁷he also adds,


"I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more."

¹⁹Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, ²⁰by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), ²¹and since we have a great priest over the house of God, ²²let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. ²³Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. ²⁴And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, ²⁵not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching. 



Rev. Gregory S. Brown



Pastor Greg is a native of Greenwood, SC. At age 17, he enlisted in the South Carolina Army National Guard. After completing his initial entry training, he enrolled at Lander University in Greenwood where he received his undergraduate degree in vocal performance.

While at Lander, he met Leah Collier; they were married on June 9, 2010. During his senior year of seminary, the Browns welcomed their first children, twins Jackson and Reagan, born in March 2013.

Shortly thereafter, he began the call process that would bring him to Fairport to serve as Associate Pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church. This was his first call upon graduation from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary of Lenoir-Rhyne University, Columbia, SC in May 2013.

Pastor Greg began his ministry at Bethlehem in August of 2013. His primary area of involvement was Christian Education – exploring ways to grow our faith and live as disciples of Jesus. In addition to serving the people of Bethlehem, Pastor Greg also served in the New York Army National Guard as a chaplain for 2nd Battalion, 108th Infantry Regiment headquartered in Utica. He was given the support of the congregation in order to fulfill both his military and BLC ministerial responsibilities.

In March of 2016, Pastor Greg left BLC, accepting a call as pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in Hickory, NC. He then returned to the South Carolina Army National Guard where he continues to serve as a chaplain.

The Browns welcomed Tucker, a healthy baby boy, into the family in February 2019. The following June, Pastor Greg answered a call to become the pastor of St. David Lutheran Church in West Columbia, SC, the same church where he completed his pastoral internship during seminary.

Leah works as a registered nurse, specializing in women's health, labor and delivery, and postpartum care. Now back in her home city of Columbia, she is the Nurse Educator for the Women's Health department at Prisma Health Baptist Hospital in downtown Columbia.



Dr. Catherine Rodland



Dr. Rodland was organist and choir director at BLC from 1990 - 1992.

Dr. Rodland, whose playing has been described as "transcendent" (The American Organist), is Artist in Residence at St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN. She graduated cum laude with departmental distinction in organ performance from St. Olaf in 1987. She received both Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY where she was a student of Russell Saunders.

While at Eastman, Dr. Rodland received the prestigious Performer's Certificate and the Ann Anway Award for excellence in organ performance. She is a prizewinner in several competitions including the 1994 and 1998 American Guild of Organists Young Artists Competition, the 1994 Calgary International Organ Competition, and the 1988 International Organ Competition at the University of Michigan, for which she received first prize. Catherine has concertized extensively throughout the United States and Canada, and has been featured often on the syndicated radio program "Pipedreams" on National Public Radio.

At St. Olaf College, Dr. Rodland teaches a full studio of organ students as well as music theory and ear training classes. She performs regularly at St. Olaf, having dedicated the Holtkamp organ in Boe Memorial Chapel in 2007, and performing as a featured soloist with the St. Olaf Orchestra and the St. Olaf Band. These performances were recorded and released as CDs through St. Olaf Records.

Dr. Rodland has presented a series of recitals featuring the complete organ symphonies of Louis Vierne, after having spent a sabbatical leave researching organs in Paris. In 2010 she released a CD, *Dedication* on the newly installed Nichols and Simpson Organ at West Side Presbyterian Church in Ridgewood, NJ.

Dr. Rodland has been the organist of the Colonial Church of Edina since September, 2016. She is married and has one daughter who also studied at the Eastman School of Music.

The Rodland Duo:

The daughters of professional musicians, Dr. Rodland and her sister, Carol, began making music together as children. Their individual careers as award-winning performers and teachers have taken them all over the world. They began performing together professionally as the Rodland Duo in 2002, with Catherine on the organ and Carol playing the viola. Rodland Duo performances have included recitals at the Luna Nova New Music Festival in Memphis, TN and the 38th International Viola Congress in Cincinnati, OH, as well



as at Indiana University, the University of Michigan, and the University of North Carolina School of the Arts.

Actively engaged in commissioning new works for their unusual combination of instruments as well as creating their own arrangements of existing compositions, their repertoire ranges from the Baroque to the contemporary. Critics have called The Rodland Duo's performances "stunning" and "beyond praise." *American Weavings*, their recording released in 2010 on the Crystal Records label, led Gramophone to declare viola and organ "an awesome combination."

100th Anniversary Reflection from Beth Walker

I am a gardener. I am familiar with roots. Roots appear first when a seed grows. They push down into the soil seeking nourishment to fuel the plant, pushing it upwards into the world. Without the roots, there is no plant.

The plant is not sustained entirely by the roots. The plant interacts with the world using sun for energy, CO₂ for food, and insects for propagation. Without the plant growing above the ground, the roots die. Foundational soil anchors both roots and plant. When the life of the plant is complete, it decomposes and becomes one with the soil.

The soil does not judge the seed. Seeds and plants do not judge each other. A rose cannot force a pumpkin to change. Each flourish as they were meant to. Each plant, with its roots, has a unique relationship to the soil and the world. Each plant blooms when the time is right.

This is the lesson of the garden:

- ❖ The soil is the Sacred, rich in unconditional love and patience; a constant and intentional source of life for all.
- ❖ We begin as seeds, instinctively seeking nourishment from the Sacred.
- Drawing on this rich and sustaining resource, we push out into the world.
- ❖ We are both root and plant. One part grounded and rooted in unbelievable love. One part experiencing and responding to the world. These parts cannot exist without each other.
- ❖ We go into the world, not to fix, change, or judge others, but to experience and learn about ourselves so we can grow in the world and in our relationship with the Sacred.
- Every person is where they need to be in their relationship with the Sacred at any given point in time. We cannot know the extent of anyone else's roots or their relationship with the Holy One. It is our own roots, our own growth, that makes the garden beautiful in the company of others.
- When our life is complete, we return to that source of unconditional love.
- * Roots, Growth, Love, Thanks be to God!
