There is no room for Mary and Joseph in the inn. They are displaced from their home, journeying to fulfill their civic requirements to be counted in the census. And yet, the time comes to give birth where they are, and so a humble home is found. A place is made, among the feeding trough, in a cramped room abounding with chaos. In many ways, Jesus is born without an invitation, and yet, he devotes his life to inviting people who are cast out. In the same way, we might imagine the story of Christmas as God's invitation to be welcomed home despite all barriers. How will we respond?

SERVICE OF HOLY COMMUNION

Call to Worship:

An unmarried teenage girl was invited to carry Christ into this world. An ordinary carpenter was invited to be a father to a child unlike any other. The shepherds were invited outcast and isolated, included at the manger. The Magi were invited foreigners and seekers, included at the manger. And if she was invited, and he was invited, and they were invited then we can trust that we too are invited. This story is for us. This love is for us. Family of faith, this is our invitation. Welcome home. Amen. O come, all ye faithful, joyful and triumphant! O, come ye, o come ye to Bethlehem; come and behold him, born the king of angels:

Sing, choirs of angels, sing in exultation, sing, all ye citizens of heaven above! Glory to God in the highest: *Refrain*

Gospel: Luke 2:1-20 (From Spark Story Bible)

Then watch for your part! You'll be invited to pick up a simple costume near the entrance to the church and process forward while we sing. You'll stay up front for the rest of the program, taking part in the growing live nativity scene in the chancel.

PART I: MARY AND JOSEPH

As the Marys and Josephs come forward, the congregation sings: "Away in a Manger" (ELW 277)

Away in a manger, no crib for his bed, the little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head; the stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay, the little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay.

The cattle are lowing; the baby awakes, but little Lord Jesus, no crying he makes. I love you, Lord Jesus; look down from the sky and stay by my cradle till morning is nigh.

Be near me, Lord Jesus; I ask you to stay close by me forever and love me, I pray. Bless all the dear children in your tender care, and fit us for heaven, to live with you there.

PART II: THE ANIMALS

As the goats, sheep, cows or donkeys come forward, the congregation sings: "Infant Holy, Infant Lowly" (ELW 276)

Infant holy, infant lowly, for his bed a cattle stall; oxen lowing, little knowing Christ the child is Lord of all. Swiftly winging, angels singing, bells are ringing, tidings bringing: Christ the child is Lord of all! Christ the child is Lord of all!

Flocks were sleeping, shepherds keeping vigil till the morning new saw the glory, heard the story, tidings of a gospel true. Thus rejoicing, free from sorrow, praises voicing, greet the morrow: Christ the child was born for you! Christ the child was born for you!

PART III: ANGELS

As the angels come forward, the congregation sings: "Angels We Have Heard on High" (ELW 289)

Angels we have heard on high, sweetly singing o'er the plains, and the mountains in reply, echoing their joyous strains.

Refrain

Gloria in excelsis Deo; gloria in excelsis Deo.

Shepherds, why this jubilee? Why your joyous strains prolong? What the gladsome tidings be which inspire your heav'nly song? *Refrain* Come to Bethlehem and see him whose birth the angels sing; come, adore on bended knee Christ the Lord, the newborn king. *Refrain*

PART IV: SHEPHERD

As the shepherds come forward, the congregation sings: "Go Tell It on the Mountain" (ELW 290)

Refrain: Go tell it on the mountain, over the hills and ev'rywhere; go tell it on the mountain that Jesus Christ is born!

While shepherds kept their watching, o'er silent flocks by night, behold, throughout the heavens there shone a holy light. *Refrain*

The shepherds feared and trembled when, lo, above the earth rang out the angel chorus that hailed our Savior's birth. *Refrain*

Down in a lowly manger the humble Christ was born; and God sent us salvation that blessed Christmas morn. *Refrain*

PART V: WISE PERSONS AND STAR

As the Star and Wise Persons come forward, the congregation sings: "The First Noel" (ELW 300)

The first Noel the angel did say was to certain poor shepherds in fields as they lay; in fields where they lay, keeping their sheep, on a cold winter's night that was so deep.

Refrain

Noel, Noel, Noel, Noel! Born is the King of Israel.

They looked up and saw a star shining in the east beyond them far; and to the earth it gave great light, and so it continued both day and night. *Refrain* And by the light of that same star three wise men came from country far; to seek for a king was their intent, and to follow the star wherever it went. *Refrain*

This star drew near to the northwest, o'er Bethlehem it took its rest; and there it did both stop and stay right over the place where Jesus lay. *Refrain*

Then entered in those wise men three, full rev'rently upon their knee, and offered there in his presence their gold, and myrrh, and frankincense. *Refrain*

PART VI: CONCLUSION

When the narrator concludes, the congregation sings: "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" (ELW 270, ST 1 and 3)

Hark! The herald angels sing, "Glory to the newborn King; peace on earth, and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled." Joyful, all you nations, rise; join the triumph of the skies; with the angelic hosts proclaim, "Christ is born in Bethlehem!" Hark! The herald angels sing, "Glory to the newborn King!"

Hail the heav'n-born Prince of peace! Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Light and life to all he brings, ris'n with healing in His wings. Mild he lays his glory by, born that we no more may die, born to raise each child of earth, born to give us second birth. Hark! The herald angels sing, "Glory to the newborn King!" Offertory Prayer: Let us pray. Good and loving God, **Your story is one that forever invites us to be our full selves, to take up space, to go where we feel called, and to allow this community to feel like home. So use these gifts to keep building your home here. With gratitude as tall as the ceiling, we pray. Amen.**

Distribution of the Light:

The pastor will light a candle from the Christ Candle and then will begin to move down the aisle lighting the candles of the congregation in this manner: the worshiper nearest the center aisle will receive the light and in turn give the light to the one by their side. <u>The lighted candle is never tilted</u>, but is always held upright when passing the light to another so that the hot wax will not be spilled.
