Welcome!

We are so glad to have you share in worship at Bethlehem today. If you are visiting, please introduce yourself to one of the pastors – they would love to greet you personally! At this time, we ask all worshipers to wear masks in worship.

Today's service will be recorded and live-streamed. Our camera operators take care to focus on worship leaders and don't regularly film worshipers. In the movement of the service, glimpses of people may occur. Please speak with a pastor if you have concerns.

Children are welcome and encouraged to participate in worship. We have designated space within the sanctuary (underneath the window of Jesus, the Good Shepherd) that is reserved for families who may need additional space for strollers or carriers for children who cannot yet wear masks. If there is a way we can make worship a more hospitable environment for your family, please speak to a pastor or leave a comment through our website (see above).

Hearing assistance: Our sound system is equipped with personal hearing loop devices. Please ask an usher for a loop device.

Holy Communion: All are welcome to share in Christ's meal of forgiveness and grace. Children who do not yet commune are welcome to come forward for a blessing. (If you feel your child is ready to receive or have additional questions, please speak with one of our pastors.) Please see additional notes about the Sacrament in the service portion of the bulletin.

Our Perrin Street entrance is accessible. Please ask an usher or greeter for help if you need assistance operating the lift.

Please silence your cell phones: As a courtesy to others, we ask that you please silence your cell phones during worship.

We Need YOU... to serve on the Worship Team!

As Lutheran Christians, we believe that worship is not a passive experience, watching and listening to the Pastor. Worship is the work of the people – that's what liturgy means! We all have a job to do in worship: lifting our voice in prayer and song, bowing our heads in prayer, opening our ears to hear the Word, and extending our hands to receive the Sacrament. It also takes many people to support the work of worship, both serving publicly and behind-the-scenes. That's why we need you!

Worship Roles Needed TODAY

Acolyte: Lights the altar candles during the prelude and extinguishes altar candles during the final hymn, bringing the light of Christ out into the world! May robe and sit on the chancel or sit within the congregation during worship. All ages who can safely handle fire and reach the candles are welcome to serve! If you'd like to help serve communion as well, snag that role too!

Glass Washer: Washes communion glasses either immediately following worship or after Faith Formation for All. Many hands make light work so grab a friend to help! (This is also a great opportunity for a household to serve together!)

Offering: Sit in the congregation and bring the offering trays forward to the altar during the offertory, giving our congregation's gifts to the glory of God! Pair up with a child if you'd like, so they can have a hands-on role in worship!

Communion Assistant: Sit in the congregation and come forward at the time of communion to serve the wine/grape juice for communion. Must be able to hold a tray steady and speak the words, "Blood of Christ shed for you!"

Intercessory Prayer Reader: From your seat, speak the highlighted petition as part of the intercessory prayers on behalf of the congregation.

Children's Sermon: Prepare and deliver message based on weekly lessons/theme, geared towards preschool and early school aged children. Consultation with Pastors is available and encouraged! Contact: Pastors or Beth Schoenfeld

Special Music: Individuals and ensembles are regularly scheduled to provide music for worship, including Chancel Choir, Folk Group, Bell Choir, Children's Choir, and more. (If you have a musical talent to share, we want to know about it!) Contact: Raelynn Clare

Each anniversary Sunday celebration is an opportunity to remember the ways that our worship is rooted in the past, even as we are growing together and sharing in faith today. For the season after Epiphany, we are using the baptismal font from BLC's original worship space, remembering the ways that baptism connects us with our brothers and sisters in the faith over the years.

Today's worship features a number of hymns that are listed as "BLC Favorites" – those hymns BLC worshipers counted among our favorites when asked in spring of 2020. Our offertory (and one of those favorite hymns!) comes from the Common Service Book of the Lutheran Church (noted as the CSB in today's bulletin), which was first published in 1917. The liturgy and hymns of the CSB supported BLC at our founding! You'll likely recognize the selections as they are still found in our hymnody today.

Each year, on the Sunday after Epiphany (January 6) we affirm our baptism, celebrating that God has chosen us as beloved children. Each week throughout the season after Epiphany, we are focusing on the responsibilities entrusted to us – as individuals and a community – in response to God's love for us at baptism. (Review these promises in the hymnal on page 228!) Today, we reflect on what it looks like to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed.

God's glory is revealed in the reading of scripture. The unity of the church is one reflection of God's glory. Most gloriously, the promises of God are fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. Gather round. Listen up. Glimpse the glory of God.

SERVICE OF HOLY COMMUNION

Confession and Forgiveness:

We gather in the name of the triune God + and return to our foundation—to words of love, starting with love for ourselves.

We pray together, Holy God,

In Christ Jesus, you lean down and enter our world with your boundless love. But we are quick to forget. We forget that in the beginning we were made good. We doubt that we could possibly be enough. Family of faith, no matter how old we get, God continues to say to us: "You are loved; you are forgiven." That is the foundation of our lives. That is the truth upon which we build our home. So breathe deeply. There is grace and peace here. Join me in proclaiming this good news:

We are loved. We are + forgiven. We are claimed. This is our foundation. Thanks be to God. Amen.



WE HEAR GOD'S WORD

Children's Moment

Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

The apostle and pastor Paul uses the metaphor of the human body to describe how intimately connected we are in the church. For this struggling congregation in Corinth, Paul delivers a vital message of unity that is a mark of the church today.

¹²For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.


¹⁴Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰As it is, there are many members, yet one body. ²¹The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²²On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; ²⁴whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, ²⁵that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

²⁷Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. ²⁹Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? ³⁰Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? ^{31a}But strive for the greater gifts.

Gospel: Luke 4:14-21

Near the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, he visits his hometown of Nazareth. In the words of Isaiah, he states and claims his identity, purpose, and mission. ¹⁴Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. ¹⁵He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

¹⁶When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, ¹⁷and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

18"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free,

¹⁹to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

²⁰And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. ²¹Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."



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100th Anniversary Reflection by John Schmeelk

A century ago there was an expectation of wonderful change and new beginnings. High hopes and excitement filled the nearly 100 members of a new church in Fairport. New birth and growth stimulated this community. Growth however, also meant change and change can be disturbing. Questions arise about the speed and direction of future development.

New communities look for growth in size. More members equal success. Difficulties come from how to organize and accommodate ever increasing numbers. Comfort that came from knowledge of everyone in the group can be lost. New ideas arise, outside conditions change and affect the group, plus original plans and goals are reassessed sometimes creating unease and anxiety.

As individuals we grow in many ways. Abilities are gained, and then often are lost with age. Beliefs are reassessed, affirmed, or cast aside. Talents appear that were unexpected and opportunities often arise from disasters. Learning, adapting, and questioning never seem to end. The search for a comfort zone becomes more attractive. There is a temptation to create and exist within a bubble.

One hundred years ago, the people of BLC Fairport lived under the same conditions. Through their effort as the hands that attempt to do God's work they built a building and a congregation of supporting people. They left a legacy through efforts that included success and failure. The example set for us by those who followed was one of endurance and true growth.

Numbers may be a measure of success but accomplishments, faithfulness to goals and a desire to improve are the true measure. Our founders were no more perfect or imperfect than we are today. Belief that our efforts to improve-grow-as individuals and a church community will always be supported by our loving God. We march on, then with the confidence and hope to continue to grow.
