Sunday, March 20, 2022 ~ Third Sunday in Lent Anniversary Sunday

Prelude:

Each anniversary Sunday celebration is an opportunity to remember the ways that our worship is rooted in the past, even as we are growing together and sharing in faith today. For the season after Lent, we are using a familiar liturgical setting (#1 from the Lutheran Book of Worship published in 1978) including parts that date back at least to the Common Service Book (published in 1917 and used at the founding of BLC). Our offertory each week, "Create in Me" is from this hymnal but likely familiar to your ears today as it is also found in our current hymnal (ELW). Today's worship also features a number of hymns that are listed as "BLC Favorites" – those hymns BLC worshipers counted among your favorites when asked in spring of 2020.

The warnings are plentiful and blunt on the third Sunday in Lent. Cut it out or get cut down! The warnings are accompanied by God's invitation to attentiveness: "Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live." The landowner's ultimatum is forestalled by the gardener's readiness to till the ground one more year. That is good news for all of us. Thanks be to God!

Sarah Hawbecker

Ms. Hawbecker served as organist and Chancel Choir Director at Bethlehem from 1988 – 1990.

She is an active recitalist, full-time church musician. and winner of competitions. She is a prize winner of both the National Young 1998 and 1996 Competition in Organ Performance. She won first place in the 1988 Undergraduate Organ Competition, Ottumwa, IA, and was a finalist in 1992 Spivey International the Ms. Hawbecker's performances Competition. recorded and broadcast been have

American Public Media's radio program *Pipedreams®*.

Ms. Hawbecker has a varied organ repertoire and enjoys designing programs tailored to the specific instrument and audience. Whether playing a "traditional" organ program, all-Bach, American composers, Halloween concerts, or interactive concerts for children, her goal is to engage the audience and share her love of the instrument and its music. Also recognized as a specialist with children's choirs, she is frequently asked to lead workshops in the area of church music and children's choir techniques.

She has presented workshops and performed for conventions of the American Guild of Organists and for conferences of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. Her articles have been published in several professional journals: *The American Organist* (AGO), *CrossAccent* (ALCM), and *The Chorister* (Choristers Guild). She has adjudicated several organ competitions, most notably the semi-final round of the 2008 National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance.

A native of Illinois, Ms. Hawbecker studied organ and church music with John Ferguson at St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN, where she received the Bachelor of Music, *magna cum laude* with Departmental Distinction, and was elected into Pi Kappa Lambda. She went on to earn the Master of Music in

Organ Performance from the Eastman School of Music, where she studied with Russell Saunders. An active lifetime member of the American Guild of Organists, she served three terms on its National Council and completed two terms on the Board of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians as a regional president.

Ms. Hawbecker is currently Organist and Director of Children's Music at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Atlanta, GA, where she has served since 1996. She is also on the staff of Orgues Létourneau Limitée of St-Hyacinthe, Québec as a project consultant and regional representative on the east coast of the United States. She is on the roster of Concert Artist Cooperative. She and her husband, William Fuller, reside in Atlanta with their teenage son, Jonathan.



She shares that among her favorite memories of her time at BLC are "breakfast with the choir at Friendly's, all the wonderful, supportive people, and teaching young piano students."



Rev. Paul Martin Adler

Rev. Paul Adler, a retired Methodist minister, lives with his wife, Laurie, in Columbus, OH where they attend Stonybrook United Methodist Church. They have two children. Son Tim is married to Adriane. Daughter Rachel and husband, Eric Amidon have a daughter, Juliette.

Rev. Adler's connection to BLC is through his father, Rev. Dallas Adler, who served BLC as pastor from 1958

1966. In addition, his mother, Marge, was both organist and choir director.
 The Adlers had five sons – Carl, Gary, Paul, John, and Dean. They were a musical family, often singing together while Marge accompanied on the piano. Gary and John are both deceased.



Rev. Adler graduated from Capital University and Lutheran Theological Seminary, both in Columbus. Upon his marriage to Laurie, they settled in Findlay, OH to be near family. Laurie was a teacher and Rev. Adler worked in the office of a company that manufactured railroad cars. During this time, he served as a part-time pastor in several United Methodist churches in the area.

Rev. Adler has many fond memories of his time at BLC. He shares: "Quite a while ago, my grandmother told me don't get old. At this point, I am not much younger than she was when she told me that. I guess I didn't listen very well.

In spite of my advancing years, I still clearly remember when, in 1958, the Adler family moved to Fairport so my dad, Dallas, could begin serving as pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church. Eventually, my mom, Marge, played the organ and directed the choirs - from the organ bench. We five boys went along to enjoy the ride. Fairport was a most excellent place to grow up. Mom and Dad both played woodwind instruments, but when the time came, Mom made sure that we boys played brass instruments. Today, that group has entered into the third generation – some of the great-grandchildren have begun to play with us. They would be so happy.

I graduated from Fairport High School fifty-some years ago. As of now, the years that I lived in Fairport add up to about a tenth of my life. And I still have so many fond memories of my years in Bethlehem Church. I am so thankful for being able to grow up in Fairport."

Rev. Adler highlights some random memories from his time in Fairport and at BLC:

- ➤ He attended Fairport schools from 5th through 12th grades.
- ➤ His closest friends were from BLC. His best friend was Denny Sharp, who also became a pastor; they served together as acolytes.
- ➤ He sang in the choirs.
- ➤ He played a brass instrument and sang with his four brothers and his father while his mother accompanied on the piano.
- ➤ The high school Sunday School class was very large.
- ➤ Luther League was most memorable. He participated in organized activities like bowling and sledding, as well as picnicking and swimming at Canandaigua Lake. He enjoyed Luther League rallies with youth from other American Lutheran Churches in the area and recalls that BLC always had the largest group.
- ➤ Catechism instruction was a 2-year program and Confirmation was a very big event.

100th Anniversary Reflection by Shiellee Weidner

I have been studying the Bible regularly for about 40 years and have discovered that it really does hold all of the answers to how to live a happy life. For instance, I had spent the early years of my life worrying about things that might happen, but often never DID come to pass. I think that worry is a coping mechanism that I had developed as a child, thinking that if I worried I could somehow protect myself from being forced to deal with a negative situation. As a result of studying God's word, gradually I've learned that worry does not come from God!

Actually, the Bible says that we are to live only in today, that we can't change yesterday because yesterday is gone. Only God knows what tomorrow will bring so we must keep our minds centered on today. Little by little I began to realize that when a problem comes along, the best thing to do is to turn it over to God in prayer!

In the beginning I found that praying like this would give me some relief, but worrying had become such a habit that the negative thoughts would pop right back into my mind over and over again.

God and I spent many years tossing worry back and forth until I learned in a *new way* to really trust our wonderful Lord! I finally learned that God would keep the worry and would only give it back to me with my permission.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4: 6-7
