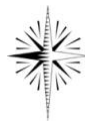

Each anniversary Sunday celebration is an opportunity to remember the ways that our worship is rooted in the past, even as we are growing together and sharing in faith today. For the season of Easter, we are returning to a familiar liturgical setting (#1 from the Lutheran Book of Worship published in 1978). This setting continues to shape our faith today and remains as setting 3 in our current ELW hymnal. Today's worship also features a number of hymns that are listed as "BLC Favorites" – those hymns BLC worshipers counted among your favorites when asked in spring of 2020.

The disciples make a big splash and eat breakfast with the risen Jesus. Wading in the water (remembering baptism) and eating with Jesus (celebrating holy communion) is our weekly encounter with the risen Christ. Jesus asks us again and again: Do you love me? And Jesus invites us, again and again, to follow him, bringing the Easter life to others.

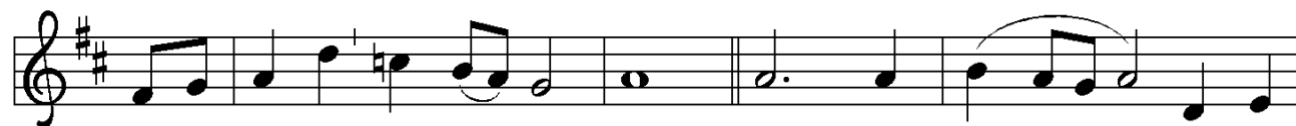

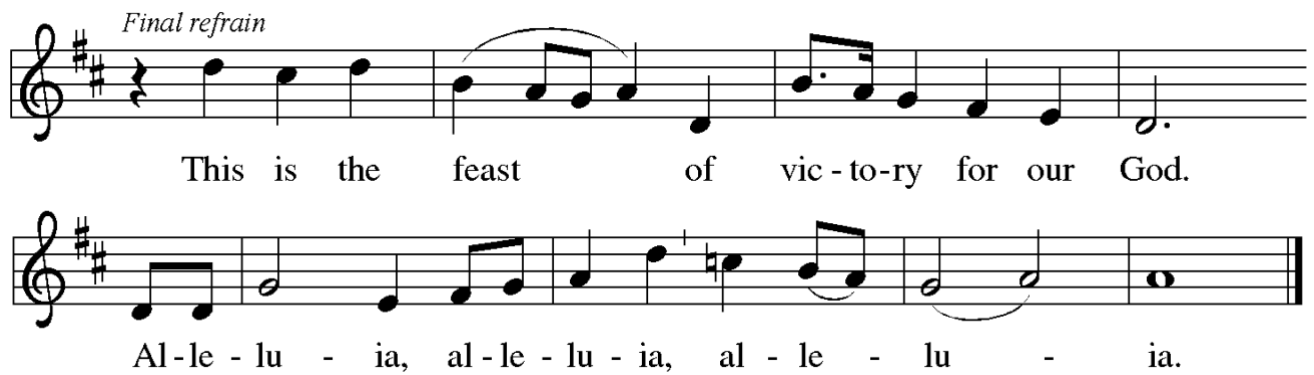

WE HEAR GOD'S WORD

Children's Moment

Reading: Acts 9:1-6 [7-20]

Saul (later called Paul) was an ardent persecutor of all who followed the Way of Christ. This reading recounts the story of his transformation beginning with an encounter with Jesus Christ on the way to Damascus.

¹Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ²and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" ⁵He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." [⁷The men who were traveling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. ⁸Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. ⁹For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

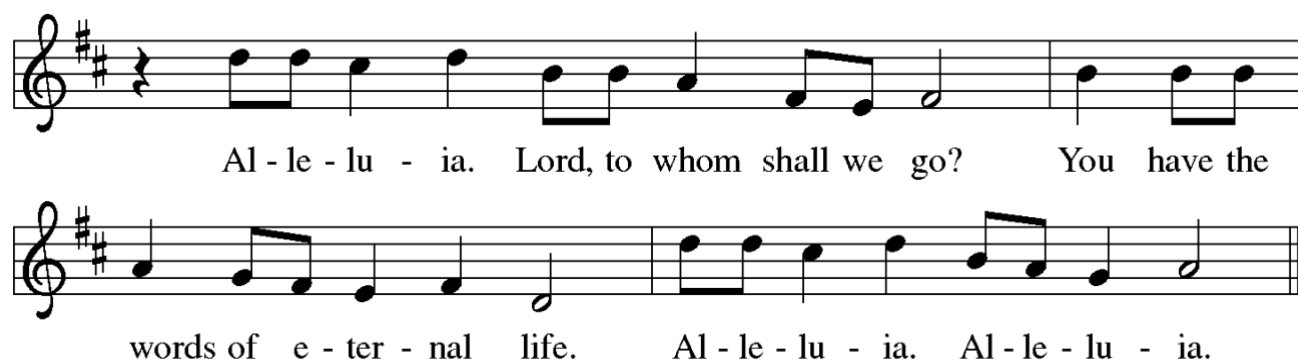
¹⁰Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." ¹¹The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, ¹²and he has seen in a

vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.” ¹³But Ananias answered, “Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; ¹⁴and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.” ¹⁵But the Lord said to him, “Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; ¹⁶I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.” ¹⁷So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, “Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.” ¹⁸And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, ¹⁹and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, ²⁰and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, “He is the Son of God.”] The word of the Lord.

Gospel: John 21:1-19

The risen Christ appears again to his disciples by the sea where they were first called. After echoes of the fishing and feeding miracles, he gives a final reminder of the cost of a disciple's love and obedience.

¹After [he appeared to his followers in Jerusalem,] Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ²Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³Simon Peter said to them, “I am going fishing.” They said to him, “We will go with you.” They went

out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

⁴Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵Jesus said to them, “Children, you have no fish, have you?” They answered him, “No.” ⁶He said to them, “Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.” So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, “It is the Lord!” When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. ⁸But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

⁹When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰Jesus said to them, “Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.” ¹¹So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹²Jesus said to them, “Come and have breakfast.” Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, “Who are you?” because they knew it was the Lord. ¹³Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

¹⁵When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, “Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?” He said to him, “Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.” Jesus said to him, “Feed my lambs.” ¹⁶A second time he said to him, “Simon son of John, do you love me?” He said to him, “Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.” Jesus said to him, “Tend my sheep.” ¹⁷He said to him the third time, “Simon son of John, do you love me?” Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, “Do you love me?” And he said to him, “Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.” Jesus said to him, “Feed my sheep. ¹⁸Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.” ¹⁹(He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, “Follow me.”

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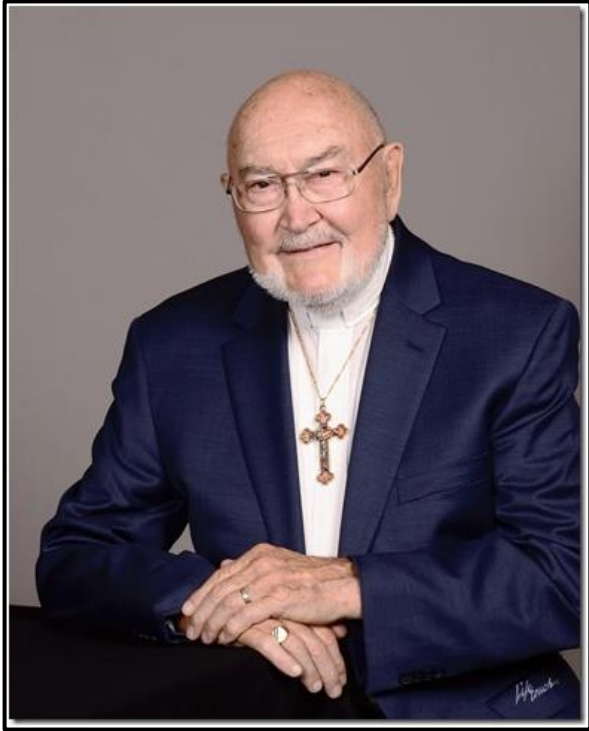
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Chaplain (Col) Richard G. Hembrock, US Army, ret.

Pastor Hembrock was born in Fairport, NY, the only son in a family of five children. He was both baptized and confirmed at BLC. He graduated from Capital University and Trinity Lutheran Seminary, both located in Columbus, OH. His ordination into the Lutheran ministry on June 7, 1959, also took place at BLC. His first call was to a three-point parish in and around Cat Spring, Texas in 1959.

In 1962, Pastor Hembrock joined the US Army as a Lutheran Chaplain, with his first tour at Fort Hood, TX. While there, he and Marilyn Goessler were married at her home church, St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Sandy Hill, TX, in 1964. They have two children, Sara Lynn Toscano, married to Timothy, of Baltimore, MD, and Joel Hembrock, married to Michele, of Hilliard, FL. They also have four grandchildren and one great-grandson.

He served two tours of duty in Viet Nam, followed by 3½ years in Germany, during which time he received his Master's Degree in Secondary Education from Boston University. That was followed by one year at Ft. Hamilton, NY, two years at Ft. Lawton, Seattle WA, and finally two years at Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

Pastor Hembrock then spent 12 years in the active reserves, retiring as Command Chaplain of the 310th TAACOM at Ft. Belvoir, VA. During this time, he was chaplain at the National Lutheran Home, interim chaplain at Ft. Detrick MD, and pastor of the Sharpsburg Parish (Mt. Zion, Holy Trinity, and Salem). Since his retirement from Sharpsburg Parish in 1994, he has served as interim pastor at Lutheran churches in Leitersburg, Smithsburg,

Feagaville, Keysville, Sharpsburg, Mount Union, and Funkstown. He also worked as a chaplain at Washington County and Meritus Hospitals in Hagerstown, MD.

Pastor Hembrock has realized that one does not retire from the call - he just finds many ways to continue to serve the Lord in answer to that call. He and Marilyn are currently active members of Trinity Lutheran Church in Smithsburg, MD, where he sings in the choir, teaches Sunday School, and participates in Men's Group and Prayer Team. He also serves the community by officiating at funerals and weddings when needed. On October 6, 2019, Trinity and the Delaware-Maryland Synod honored him with a 60th anniversary celebration of his ordination, with friends from across the United States joining the celebration, including the pastor who married them in 1964. Marilyn is currently working on preparations for the 200th anniversary celebration of the founding of Trinity. She will be joining her husband when he comes to lead worship during our anniversary celebration. In his spare time, Pastor Hembrock serves as chaplain and honor guard for Morris Frock Post 42, The American Legion, a spiritual director for Via de Cristo, and works on his small farm. He is president of the Joint Veterans Council, which dedicated a new Vietnam War Monument on Vietnam Veterans Day, March 29, 2019. He is President of the Smithsburg Lions Club and treasurer of two other organizations. He enjoys travelling, having driven to Alaska on two of his six visits there, as well as numerous cross-country trips, and throughout Europe. He loves being outdoors, whether working, hunting, fishing, or playing a round of golf.

100th Anniversary Reflection by Toni Thompson

In Luke 3:11, John the Baptist tells us, "The man with two tunics should share with him who has none, and the one who has food should do the same." Sharing is an instinctive reflex in our human psyche. When we see another in need, we automatically and immediately search our closets or our pantries to see what we can give to someone who really needs help. A great example is how the community of Perinton responded to the terrible fire at the Pines of Perinton which left sixty-five people homeless. Before some of us could react to the disaster, the community had already fulfilled all material needs. Across the nation, every time there is a disaster – tornado, flood, fire – there is a generous outpouring of goods and money to help people we don't even know get back on their feet and restore their lives.

Children share naturally – both tangible items as well as their affection. It is so touching to see little kids greet each other with a hug and with delight. When my godson, Max, as a very little boy, he was fascinated with minerals and stones. One time he discovered a little clear crystal which really intrigued him, but he immediately said, "Here, Aunt Toni. This is for you." I still treasure that little crystal in my curio cabinet as a reminder of his generosity of spirit.

Just as important as sharing our material goods and our treasure is sharing in each other's joys and sorrows. When someone becomes engaged and marries, or has a baby, or graduates from school, we rejoice with each other. Likewise, when someone falls ill, or suffers a loss, we are there with compassion and sympathy and encouragement. This, too, is a natural human response to someone else's situation.

We are graced with the impulse to share by the Holy Spirit which binds us together in community. In the hymn "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" the words of the third stanza are,

"We share each other's woes, our mutual burdens bear; and often for each other flows the sympathizing tear."
