Hearing assistance: Our sound system is equipped with personal hearing loop devices. Please ask an usher for a loop device.

Holy Communion: All are welcome to share in Christ's meal of forgiveness and grace. Children who do not yet commune are welcome to come forward for a blessing. (If you feel your child is ready to receive or have additional questions, please speak with one of our pastors.) This setting continues to shape our faith today and remains as setting 3 in our current ELW hymnal. Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. Jesus provides visions of peace that surpasses human understanding and power beyond human imagination.

A vision compels Paul to move his ministry into Greece. There he meets Lydia, an important person in the business community, whose heart has been opened by God to receive the gospel. Her conversion and baptism provide the impetus for the founding of the church at Philippi.


⁹During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." ¹⁰When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

¹¹We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, ¹² and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. ¹³On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. ¹⁴A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. ¹⁵When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.



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
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Rev. Wayne R. Shipman

Pastor Shipman was born in Jersey City, NJ, the oldest of four children of Gertrude and Russell Shipman. He lived his early years in Whippany, NJ. As a young man he became interested in photography and graphic arts, taking pictures and studying printing for three years in high school.

Pastor Shipman graduated from Rochester Institute of Technology in 1979. He married Janet Cahill in October 1985 and began a long career in the area of graphic arts. Soon after their marriage, they moved to Derry, NH, where they began their family. It was then that he joined a Kodak subsidiary in Massachusetts to become a technical specialist in electronic color separation systems.

Most of his career at Eastman Kodak was involved in technical color, professional digital photography, and field service, and ended with an extended time teaching field engineers to install and maintain laser platesetters for the offset and flexographic printing processes. He was able to travel worldwide and often visited churches when he was 'stranded' in a distant city for a work weekend.

Pastor Shipman's parents were founding members of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, an LCA congregation, in Parsippany, NJ, where he learned about church and Jesus by setting up the plywood altar and pulpit, helping his mom with altar guild, and becoming an acolyte. Moving to a different congregation to take confirmation classes, he became more involved, becoming an usher and lector. One summer he was given the opportunity to lead a few Morning Prayer services when the pastor was on vacation.

Pastor Shipman's call story began in college, where he was involved with campus ministry and leadership. The campus chaplain suggested seminary, but he decided that was too much school! Again, after moving his young family to Fairport, NY and beginning a time in the Episcopal church, he

investigated becoming a deacon, but it meant dropping everything and studying full time, which didn't fit into the family plans. In 2012, he returned to the ELCA and Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Fairport.

Feeling a renewed call, Pastor Shipman asked about becoming a deacon in the Lutheran tradition. This began a prayerful exploration and a call to ordination and pastoral ministry. After starting seminary as a Distributed Learning student, he ended his Kodak career in order to be available for the fulltime formation activities of chaplaincy training, internship, and study.

The one-year internship at Grace Lutheran Church in Wenatchee, WA with Pastor James Aalgaard was a defining time and opened up new ideas for where the church and the Holy Spirit might take him. He received a Master of Divinity from United Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia, PA in 2020. Pastor Shipman was ordained on September 12, 2020 and accepted a dual call to serve at both Emanuel Lutheran Church in Blackfoot, ID and Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in Pocatello, ID, both congregations of Northwest Intermountain Synod of the ELCA.

Pastor Shipman's interests are reading, Revolutionary War history, and not surprisingly, church. Never a sports buff, he enjoys a wide range of music but especially jazz and jazz piano. He and Janet have three adult children, all located in different parts of the country. They live in Pocatello and are enjoying all the northwest has to offer.

Our Home-making God

Into the midst of our anxiety and alarm we are offered a vision of a glorious future filled with promise—the promise that God will make a home with us. This is a promise of an ultimate future home—a New Jerusalem!—but also a promise of God's daily homemaking presence in the hearts of all who believe. Paul has a vision of a cry for help from Macedonia, and his beloved church at Philippi is founded in the home and household of Lydia. In Revelation, John, turning from the lake of fire, is carried up in a vision and sees the New Jerusalem coming down, centered on the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. But no longer is there separation from God, weeping, or mourning, but now a restored creation where God and God's people are at home together. Jesus promises that though he is going away, he will come to his disciples in the power of an advocate, the Holy Spirit, and that both he and the Father will make their home in all who believe. The gathering of the faithful assembly to receive Christ's word and sacrament is a foretaste of that New Jerusalem, where God will finally and ultimately be at home with us, even as the Holy Trinity makes a home now in the hearts of all who believe. Into the anxieties and uncertainties of our everyday life we are offered both a vision of a glorious future when God will be at home with us and we will be at home with God, and a living foretaste of that same future: "We will come to them and make our home with them. . . . Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you" (John 14:23b, 27a).
