**Holy Communion:** All are welcome to share in Christ's meal of forgiveness and grace. Children who do not yet commune are welcome to come forward for a blessing. (If you feel your child is ready to receive or have additional questions, please speak with one of our pastors.) Each anniversary Sunday celebration is an opportunity to remember the ways that our worship is rooted in the past, even as we are growing together and sharing in faith today. For the season of Easter, we are returning to a familiar liturgical setting (#1 from the Lutheran Book of Worship published in 1978). This setting continues to shape our faith today and remains as setting 3 in our current ELW hymnal. Today's worship also features a number of hymns that are listed as "BLC Favorites" – those hymns BLC worshipers counted among your favorites when asked in spring of 2020.

"O Lord our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!" Today we celebrate the holy Trinity. Paul writes that through Jesus we have peace with God, whose love pours into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, giving us lasting hope. We celebrate the gracious One-in-Three, eternal Three-in-One, as we worship in community; as we share water and word, bread and wine; and as we bring God's love and hope to our neighbors.




### Gospel: John 16:12-15








## Rev. Julie B. Bergdahl

Pastor Bergdahl served BLC as Associate Pastor from 1991–1994, where her focus was on youth, education, missions, and evangelism. In addition, she filled in for Pastor Kent Garner during the time of his 4-month sabbatical.

Pastor Bergdahl received her Bachelor of Arts in Psychology with Academic Distinction from the University of Virginia in 1986, and Master of Divinity from Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia in 1991, where she was the recipient of the Rev. Dr. Paul J. Hoh Award for Academic Excellence and Potential for Ministry. She also took part in the Post-Graduate Program at The Bowen Center for the Study of the Family, Washington, DC from 2011-2014, earning a Certificate of Attendance.

After leaving BLC, Pastor Bergdahl was called to the position of Pastor/Mission Developer at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Sturbridge, MA where she served until 2000. She then accepted

a call to Redeemer Lutheran Church in Plattsburg, NY, serving until 2007, before moving to St. Michael's Lutheran Church in Sellersville, PA. She is recently retired and lives in Quakertown, PA

Pastor Bergdahl's professional work includes: Princeton Family Center for Education, NJ, Faculty and Board Member; Presenter, Family Systems for Clergy; and Presenter for new Pastors and Interim Pastors in the Southeastern PA Synod. Her work for the Southeastern PA Synod also includes serving on Bishop's Convocation Planning Team, Candidacy Committee, Synod Listening Panel, and Stewardship Team. Upper Bucks Conference responsibilities involve Executive Committee Member, convenor of the Upper Bucks Rostered Leaders Gatherings and organizer of large-scale Meal Packing Events and Puerto Rico refugee assistance efforts.

Pastor Bergdahl's personal interests include genealogy and family history, following the US Women's National Soccer Team, Snoopy, running/working out, and community gardening.

Pastor Bergdahl shares some of her favorite memories of her time at BLC: "These are things that make me smile...

1. I had a great time with the choir, especially the year the Bills played the Redskins in the Super Bowl and the choir was in maroon gowns with gold stoles (Redskin colors). Growing up in the Washington DC area, I commented with appreciation on the choir's choice of colors that Sunday. I was told I started a movement to get new choir robes!

2. Opening a really big box at Bible Study on my 30<sup>th</sup> birthday and pulling out a huge teddy bear that I had to drive home in my car that night. As he took up the entire passenger seat, I prayed I wouldn't get pulled over on the way home.

3. I still have some of the dishes from the "kitchen shower" held for me on my second Sunday at BLC. I was brand new and just had rented an apartment! That will be 30 years ago at the time I visit with you.

4. I still do 'bag skits' once in a while, thanks to Jim Berner and the 4 - 6 grade sleepover crew!

5. My first month at BLC, I attended the National Youth Gathering in Dallas, TX with our youth. They didn't know what to call me and didn't want to shout 'Pastor Bergdahl' while walking the streets of Dallas. They nicknamed me 'PB' and gave me a peanut butter lollipop they had bought. The name still sticks today, but I no longer have the lollipop!

6. I still have the chime clock given to me on my last Sunday at BLC. It tolls every hour and makes me think of Bethlehem."

### Dr. Kathy Elwood



Dr. Elwood, a second-generation Californian, was born and raised in Orange, CA. She attended UC Irvine, where she earned her Bachelor of Arts in Piano Performance and an elementary-level teaching certificate. She taught elementary vocal and instrumental music in northern California for several years, and served as the children's music director at First Baptist Church of Richmond, CA. With her husband Kerry, she lived in western Europe for

8 months, doing research in libraries across the continent.

Dr. Elwood then moved to Montreal, Quebec, Canada, where she taught both voice and piano lessons, acted as accompanist for the People's Church of Montreal choir, and was the vocal soloist for "The Church Hour," a local radio Sunday morning program. This was followed by a move to Vancouver, British Columbia, where she was an adjunct professor at Trinity Western College, teaching music history and theory, and accompanying the college choirs, as well as the chancel choir of the Evangelical Free Church of Langley. During this time she was blessed with three daughters – Kristy, Kelly, and Kimberly.

Dr. Ellwood then moved to Norman, Oklahoma, where she taught elementary school music and accompanied the Norman Community Choral Society.

Returning to southern California with her three daughters, Dr. Elwood earned a Master of Music in Choral Conducting at UC Irvine, as well as a Doctor of Musical Arts (Conducting and Church Music) and a PhD in Music History at the University of Southern California. She was an adjunct professor at UC Irvine, conducting choirs and teaching music theory and music history, as well as a teaching assistant at USC in ethnic music.Dr. Elwood accepted the position of Director of Choral Activities at the University of Rochester in 1992. In the fall of the same year, she became the Choral Director at Bethlehem Lutheran Church, where she served until 2003. Shortly thereafter, she met and married Mike Elwood, a widower, and the two of them undertook the task of raising five teenagers. Under the leadership of Pastor Kent Garner, the music program blossomed. In addition to the Chancel Choir, organist and accompanist, Susan DePasquale, created and directed two children's choirs. Gayle Ehlers donated the funds to purchase a set of hand bells in memory of Ted Ehlers. It was at this time that Dr. Elwood established and conducted both the adult and children's hand bell choirs.



The Chancel Choir grew to over 50 members and began outreach efforts, performing concerts both at the church and in the greater Rochester community to help raise money for various causes. "Journeys with Jesus," musical programs taken out into senior living facilities to present to the residents, was a big part of this outreach. In order to fund these ministry opportunities, the music groups recorded and sold CDs.

With the incredible talent, experience, and direction of Bob and Phyllis Stock, the Chancel Choir also reached out to the Fairport community, offering performances of *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat* in both 1998 and 2003. The shows were scheduled for Friday and Saturday evenings across two weekends, but demand for the free tickets was so great that for the second run the dress rehearsals were opened for people to attend.

The decline in health of Dr. Elwood's mother precipitated a move back to California in 2003. For several years Kathy directed the Seventh Day Adventist Choir of Garden Grove and also established the musical/dramatic outreach group, the Trinity Players, at Trinity Episcopal Church in Orange. She has since retired from choral conducting, but continues to direct the Trinity Players.

### Drawn into Relationship, Guided into Truth

The doctrine of the Trinity invites us to consider how a God constituted by relationship—the Father with the Son, the Son with the Spirit, the Spirit with the Father—draws us into that relationship with God and one another. Gradually or suddenly, through the work of the Spirit, we come to know our belonging to the Father and to Christ's body.

In such loving relationships, truth is discovered. But people cannot bear the truth all at once, so discipleship and faith formation are gradual processes of listening for the Spirit's voice. Christian practices such as worship, learning, and service are occasions for people of all ages to be "guided into truth." Such practices are rooted in baptism, in which God draws us into a lifelong relationship in which we grow into truth and love over time—guided by the Spirit, accompanied by Jesus, and having peace with the Father.

In Romans, we hear the truth of how love originates and grows in us: Poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, God's love gives us a hope that will never disappoint. Christian community offers the delightful opportunity to experience one's own growth in hope, faith, and love, and to witness others' growth as they too are drawn more deeply into relationship with the triune God. Trinity Sunday offers the delightful opportunity to celebrate that growth.
