LAMENT AND REFLECTION

Laments make up roughly one-third of the Book of Psalms, though they rarely appear in our regular worship readings. The language of lament contained in the Psalms provides a guide for us to pray to God about the sadness, anger, disillusionment, disappointment, grief, and despair we feel over our lives and the world. In other words, when we lament, we name the wilderness we are experiencing – individually or collectively – trusting that God hears us.
